We experienced another year of growth, continuing a pattern we have seen every year since our inception.

Our impact has grown alongside meaningful changes in the neighborhood. We welcomed new institutional partners such as Cook Children's and JPS, with Child Care Associates set to join the community in 2026. At the same time, the Las Vegas Trail neighborhood has experienced a double-digit decrease in violent crime. Thanks to the dedication of our officers and community partners, the positive shift is both visible and deeply felt.

Education and opportunity remain central to our mission. Cougar Corner continues to support students across the entire neighborhood pyramid, and this year we proudly celebrated our first college and technical school graduates from our inaugural education cohort. Across cohorts, LVTRise has helped students secure more than one million dollars in financial aid and scholarships—opening doors to futures once thought out of reach.

Throughout this report, you'll find highlights that reflect our shared vision: strengthening community bonds, expanding access to education and career pathways, promoting sustainability, and responding with agility to the evolving needs of our community members. Each milestone is a testament to what can be accomplished when we work together with purpose and resolve.

None of this would be possible without the unwavering support of our staff, volunteers, partners, and donors. Your belief in LVTRise continues to fuel our work and deepen our impact. I am profoundly grateful for your partnership.

As we look toward the future, I am filled with optimism and anticipation. With your continued support, I am confident that we will keep building momentum, meeting challenges with determination, and creating lasting opportunity in the Las Vegas Trail community.

The **LAS VEGAS TRAIL REVITALIZATION PROJECT**, known as LVTRise, is a heartfelt collaboration of private companies, human service organizations, and government agencies, this initiative is committed to supporting the residents of the Las Vegas Trail (LVT) area in creating a better neighborhood and a brighter future. In response to the challenges of crime, unemployment, and educational gaps, the organization is focused on uplifting the community, offering resources that drive lasting change while also making an immediate, positive impact on daily life.

Vision

The vision of LVTRise is to amplify the Las Vegas Trail community's strengths and ambitions to become a vibrant and sustainable community.

Mission

LVTRise is a community hub providing access to long-term solutions. Our services and programs are designed and influenced by the community to best support their goals.

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Neighborhood updates

In 2025, progress in Las Vegas Trail continued to reflect the power of collaboration anchored by LVTRise as the neighborhood's community hub. By convening partners, aligning resources, and centering the voices of community members, we work collectively to ensure essential supports are accessible, connected, and responsive to the community's needs.

One of the most significant milestones this year was the opening of the Cook Children's/JPS clinic within the Las Vegas Trail Neighborhood Health Center. Through years of partnership and coordination, health care is now available directly in the neighborhood—reducing barriers to access and easing transportation challenges for families. Since opening, the clinic has begun serving patients, created employment opportunities for community members, and expanded access to care that supports long-term health and wellness.

In partnership with WestAid, the on-site food pantry continues to strengthen food security for community members, while the Fort Worth Police Department storefront—home to the Crime Free Multi-Housing Program—reinforces a shared commitment to safety through education, relationship-building, and collaboration between officers, property managers, and community members.

Support for children, youth, and working families remains central to this collective work. The Las Vegas Trail Boys & Girls Club branch provides a trusted space for youth through academic support, enrichment, mentorship, and safe out-of-school care. Looking ahead, Child Care Associates will open their Early Head Start and Head Start programs in their new facility on the LVTRise campus, expanding access to high-quality early childhood education and care for families with young children. This addition will help parents maintain employment while ensuring children are supported during their most critical developmental years.

Together, this collaborative work touches all five LVTRise pillars—creating safer neighborhoods, expanding educational access, supporting housing stability, improving health and wellness, and opening pathways to employment and workforce development.



Revitalization & Economic Development

In 2025, the focused investments we've long believed in became tangible, life-changing resources for community members in Las Vegas Trail—reflecting our commitment to collaboration, empowerment, and lasting impact. The Las Vegas Trail Neighborhood Health Center officially opened its doors this summer and is now actively serving families in the community, marking a major milestone that has been years in the making. This clinic is a powerful example of what's possible when partners work together with shared purpose. Families no longer face the stress of arranging transportation across the city to access medical care; instead, trusted pediatric and primary health services are now within walking distance. By bringing care directly into the neighborhood, we are empowering families to prioritize their health while removing barriers that too often stand in the way.

The clinic has also created jobs for community members and expanded access to essential supports, including the on-site West Aid food pantry—deepening its impact by addressing health, nutrition, and economic stability together.

Construction is complete on the Child Care Associates facility located on our campus, with an anticipated opening in early 2026. This partnership will further strengthen families by providing high-quality Early Head Start and Head Start programming close to home, supporting working parents, and creating additional employment and career pathways within the community.

These partnerships demonstrate what it means to collaborate with intention, empower community members, and create meaningful impact. By embedding critical resources—health care, food access, child care, and employment—directly into the neighborhood, we are reducing barriers, strengthening families, and continuing to build a healthier, more connected Las Vegas Trail community.

Lillian Collins with the Public Improvement District (PID) reported:

“PID 21 is a valued community asset that plays an important role in improving public safety, maintaining cleanliness, and supporting essential services. Its work helps create a safe, connected, and thriving environment where residents and businesses can benefit from a well-maintained and secure district. Through targeted investments in security, community services, and neighborhood improvements, the Las Vegas Trail PID remains focused on supporting the well-being of the area. The Las Vegas Trail PID Advisory Board oversees the allocation of resources to advance key community priorities. Funding is directed toward community safety through the use of off-duty Fort Worth police officers, expanded security camera coverage, and other safety measures. Community services are supported through ongoing programs, access to essential social services, and efforts that promote quality housing. Additional resources are invested in neighborhood enhancements, including community projects, trash abatement, and beautification initiatives that improve both the appearance and functionality of the district. In 2025, the PID provided approximately 3,000 hours of off-duty police patrols. Through its contractor, Upspire, an average of more than 82 bags of trash were collected each month, totaling roughly 800 pounds of waste removed monthly.”

Safety

At LVTRise, we are profoundly grateful for the partnership we share with the Fort Worth Police Department (FWPD) and our Neighborhood Police Officers (NPOs). The measurable reductions in crime are significant, but the real transformation is seen in the everyday interactions between officers and community members—children, teens, families, and seniors alike—who are building trust and connection in meaningful ways. From community events to simple moments on the courts or in apartment parking lots, these relationships are reshaping how safety is experienced across Las Vegas Trail. The progress we celebrate today would not be possible without NPO's who consistently show up, invest in relationships, and remain committed to moving this community forward—together.

Sergeant Andrew Owen, West Division NPO, shared that 2025 saw a continued decrease in violent crime across the Las Vegas Trail area, crediting the progress in part to strong collaboration between law enforcement, residents, and community partners. He reflected that 2024 marked a significant turning point in safety, with notable statistical reductions in violent crime — momentum that carried forward and strengthened throughout 2025.

Over the last two years, from 2023 through November of 2025, we have experienced decreases in crime categories well beyond that of violent crime only. Crime statistics from the most recent NIBRS (National Incident-Based Reporting System) report for the Las Vegas Trail area show that property crimes (burglary and theft-related offenses) during this timeline are down 25%. Auto thefts are down 39%. Crimes against society (weapons and narcotics related offenses) are down 46%. Robbery offenses are down 54%. Aggravated assault offenses year over year are down 31%.

Sergeant Owen stated:

“We are pleased with the results we are seeing thus far but recognize that we still have a long way to go. With respect to the pursuit of achieving a collective positive sentiment shift around public safety within the Las Vegas Trail area, we believe that the development and growth of personal relationships between community members and law enforcement officers is paramount. I am proud to report that the relationship between the Fort Worth Police Department and the community members of the Las Vegas Trail area is stronger than ever, and 2025 was an undeniable reflection of this. Whether officers are participating in a three-legged race with youth from the community at the LVTRise Field Day, helping pass out candy at the LVTRise Easter and Halloween festivals, or simply participating in an impromptu game of pickup basketball with anyone willing to play at the Rise courts, this is a group of law enforcement officers that understand the value of building community relationships.”

Safety

We have prioritized creating opportunities for community members to engage in non-punitive interactions with police officers, and the consistent presence of the NPOs in the community has made that possible. As a result of these positive interactions, community members now feel comfortable initiating conversations with officers and sharing needs that arise within their households. In turn, officers have taken the next step by connecting community members to resources at LVTRise.

Sergeant Owen went on to say:

"In addition to the events at LVTRise throughout the year, in December of 2025 several members of the West Division Neighborhood Police Officer Unit partnered with LVTRise and Cook Children's Hospital to hold the first Las Vegas Trail Santa Parade, as we traveled a route through several apartment complexes in the area to spread the holiday spirit. It was an amazing thing to witness as Christmas music would play over the vehicle speakers and slowly residents would begin to peek out of their windows, step out on their balconies, and then rush down into the parking lot to greet our Santa Claus and other parade walkers as they passed out candy and small gifts. The joy and excitement from community members were palpable and is something that has been missing from the Las Vegas Trail area for far longer than it should have been.

I've had more conversations with individuals on the streets of this corridor than I can remember over the last year where longstanding residents report that things in the area "just feel different" now. In the West Division NPO office, the directive for these efforts is to simply "keep going."

The progress we see today is a direct result of the intentionality of partnership over the years between LVTRise and FWPD.



Education

At LVTRise, education remains a central priority and a critical pathway to long-term stability for families in the Las Vegas Trail community. Through our ongoing Education Committee Meetings, we remain closely connected to the evolving needs of students, educators, and campuses, allowing us to respond with intention and partnership. We actively support both on- and off-campus events throughout the Western Hills Pyramid and at IDEA Rise, strengthening relationships and ensuring students and families feel supported beyond the classroom.

In 2024, LVTRise officially merged with Cougar Pride Alliance, a milestone that significantly deepened our engagement with neighborhood schools. Through this merger, we acquired Cougar Corner at Western Hills High School, expanding our presence on campus and increasing our ability to meet the immediate and long-term needs of students and faculty. This alignment has allowed us to streamline services, reduce barriers, and provide more effective wraparound support for Western Hills High School students and their families. By engaging directly with students, we are often able to identify and respond to family needs as they arise, strengthening the connection between schools and the surrounding community.

The impact of this work is tangible and collaborative. In the 2024-2025 school year, Cougar Corner provided a total of 700 food bags to students over Christmas break, and Spring break, ensuring students had access to food during extended breaks. Due to an increase in need in fall 2025, an additional 760 food bags were distributed through neighborhood and campus-based efforts. During the 2024–2025 school year, LVTRise provided 18,666 meals to students at Western Hills High School — an increase of more than 4,000 meals from the previous school year. While we are grateful to be positioned to meet higher levels of need, these numbers underscore the ongoing challenges facing students and families and highlight that our work is far from complete.

Our partnership with Pre-College Solutions continues to be a cornerstone of our education strategy, supporting students and parents as they prepare for life after graduation — whether that path leads to college, trade school, or military service. The program offers comprehensive support, including college application and FAFSA assistance, campus tours, career exploration days, and financial guidance. Parents are also welcomed into LVTRise to access additional wraparound services for their families.

This year's Pre-College Solutions cohort included 14 graduating seniors, an increase of three students from the previous year, and achieved a 100% graduation rate. Of these graduates, 65% enrolled in college, 21% enrolled in trade school, and 14% enlisted in the military.

Education

Collectively, students secured \$386,700 in financial aid and scholarships, and three participants earned opportunities as student-athlete recruits. To reduce barriers during the transition beyond high school, LVTRise provided financial assistance for participants to help cover housing deposits, new student orientation fees, meningitis vaccinations, and other critical expenses, while also helping some families in the cohort maintain stable housing during a pivotal transition period.

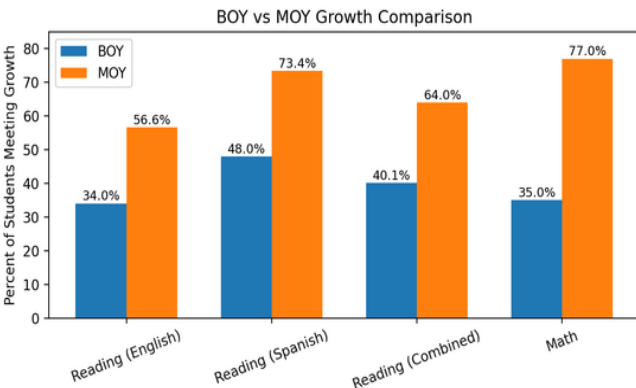
Behind every data point is a child learning to read with confidence, solving a math problem independently, or walking into school believing they are capable of success. We are deeply grateful for the school leadership and staff who pour into students and families each day, shaping not just academic outcomes but lifelong opportunity. It has been a true honor to partner with our local schools to help ensure students and families have the support, resources, and stability they need to thrive.

Principal Andrea Johnson of Western Hills Primary shared an exciting update with us on the achievements of her students and staff:

“I wanted to take a moment to share an update and say thank you. This year marks year two of sustained literacy and math gains at Western Hills Primary. By Winter, our data reflected large preliminary gains and early acceleration across reading and math, including strong growth when compared to national peers. Your partnership through LVT has played an important role in creating the conditions that made this work possible. From family support to resources and responsiveness, your presence has consistently strengthened both our students and our school community.

We know these results reflect shared effort, and we are grateful to walk this work alongside partners who are deeply committed to students and families. Thank you for continuing to show up, support, and believe in what’s possible.”

Points from the Data

Students began the year with different starting points by instructional language, with Spanish Reading entering higher at BOY.

By Winter, strong acceleration is evident across all areas, including growth from both lower and higher BOY baselines. *Spanish Reading shows high to exceptional conditional growth, indicating accelerated progress relative to national peers.

Math demonstrates rapid early acceleration with high conditional growth percentiles.

BOY to MOY patterns confirm growth was established early and sustained through effective instructional systems.

Health & Wellness

Every Tuesday, our campus becomes more than a building — it becomes a lifeline. Cars begin lining up long before we open. Community members arrive on foot, some pulling small wagons, others already calculating how much they can carry home. There is quiet determination in those early morning moments. Parents thinking about dinner. Grandparents stretching fixed incomes. Children who simply need to eat.

They come for a simple but essential resource: a ready-made food box provided through our partnership with the Tarrant Area Food Bank. But what they leave with is more than groceries. Inside each box is relief. Stability. Dignity. It means paychecks can stretch just a little further. It means fewer impossible choices between rent, medicine, and food. It means children and seniors do not go to bed hungry.

Because of Cook Children's commitment to reimbursing our weekly delivery costs, we were able to keep those pantry doors open without compromise. Their investment didn't just cover an expense — it multiplied impact. It allowed us to redirect critical funding into other urgent community needs. That is what strategic generosity looks like: one act of support creating ripple effects that strengthen an entire neighborhood.

Through our partnership with Texas Health Community Hope, we also offer a bi-weekly fresh produce pantry that restores something equally important — choice. Families "shop" farmers-market style, selecting fruits and vegetables they know their children will actually eat and their households will truly use. There is laughter. There are recipe ideas exchanged. There is pride in choosing what goes on your own table. Week after week, our campus stays full — serving community members not only from Las Vegas Trail, but from across the city and beyond. The need is real. And so is the trust our community places in us.

Access to healthcare expanded in powerful ways as well. The Tarrant County Health Department continued hosting weekly STD testing on our campus — and for the first time in LVTRise history, they began offering on-site treatment and a vaccine clinic. What once required multiple appointments, bus rides across town, time off work, and childcare coordination can now happen in one trusted, familiar location. Fewer barriers. Faster care. Better outcomes. For families balancing so much, that convenience can mean the difference between seeking care — or going without.

In a transformational step forward for the Las Vegas Trail community, the Las Vegas Trail Healthcare Clinic is now operating in partnership with Cook Children's, JPS Health Network, and the West Aid food pantry.

Health & Wellness

For a neighborhood that has long faced significant barriers to medical services, this collaboration represents more than expanded access. By bringing trusted healthcare systems directly into the heart of the community, families now experience continuity of care, stronger support systems, and the reassurance that high-quality healthcare is not out of reach.

Recognizing the trauma many LVT families carry — often quietly and across generations — we partnered with the Community Healing and Mental Health Project (CHAMP) to offer trauma-informed classes for youth and parents. These sessions create safe spaces for honest conversation, equip families with practical coping tools, and make healing feel possible. CHAMP is helping normalize mental health support in our community, and the response has been overwhelmingly encouraging.

Equally important, through partnerships with Cook Children's and the UNT Health Science Center, we administered 104 childhood vaccine doses and provided 43 sports physicals — ensuring students remained enrolled in school.

None of this happens by accident. It happens because of partners and supporters who believe that access — to food, to healthcare, to healing — should not depend on a zip code.

Case Management

At LVTRise, case management is not a side service. It is the heartbeat of our work and one of the defining ways we set ourselves apart. Our turnaround time, hands-on approach, and measurable deliverables ensure that when a neighbor reaches out in crisis, they are met with urgency, dignity, and action. Our Case Manager served 418 individuals this year, providing personalized, one-on-one support that moved families from uncertainty to stability.

We stood beside community members pursuing employment — offering job skills training, resume development, interview preparation, and hands-on job search assistance. For many, this meant the difference between ongoing financial instability and a sustainable income.

We responded to urgent housing concerns — coordinating rental assistance, utility support, security deposits, and addressing code compliance issues. When families were on the brink of eviction or living in unsafe conditions, our Case Manager worked swiftly to stabilize their housing and prevent displacement.

We supported educational advancement — helping community members access programs, complete applications, and remove barriers standing in the way of personal growth and long-term opportunity.

We assisted with securing critical documentation — birth certificates, IDs, Social Security cards — the essential items that unlock access to employment, housing, healthcare, and benefits. What may seem like “paperwork” is often the first step toward reclaiming independence.

We met basic needs with compassion and efficiency — connecting families to food, emergency resources, and wraparound services that restore both stability and dignity.

This is intensive, relational work. It requires trust. It requires responsiveness. It requires walking alongside people during some of the most vulnerable moments of their lives.

Our case management model doesn't just provide referrals — it delivers results. It shortens the time between crisis and stability. It removes barriers quickly. It ensures follow-through. And it creates measurable progress toward self-sufficiency. That is what sets LVTRise apart.

Behind every one of those 418 engagements is a story — a family that avoided eviction, a parent who secured employment, a student who stayed enrolled, a community member who regained hope.

This is the weight of the work. And this is the impact.

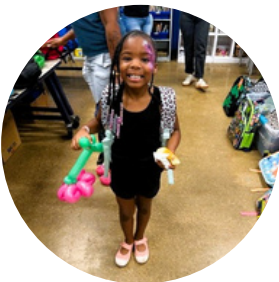

Housing

In 2025, Crime Free Multi-Housing efforts continued to play an important role in neighborhood safety throughout the Las Vegas Trail area. Fort Worth's structured Crime Free Multi-Housing Program—delivered in partnership with property owners and managers, community stakeholders, and the Fort Worth Police Department—supports multifamily communities in adopting best practices that reduce crime and improve quality of life. With more than 7,000 housing units in the Las Vegas Trail and approximately 84% located in multifamily apartment communities, this work remains especially meaningful in our neighborhood, where stable housing is not just a need but a foundation for everything else—education, employment, health, and long-term opportunity.

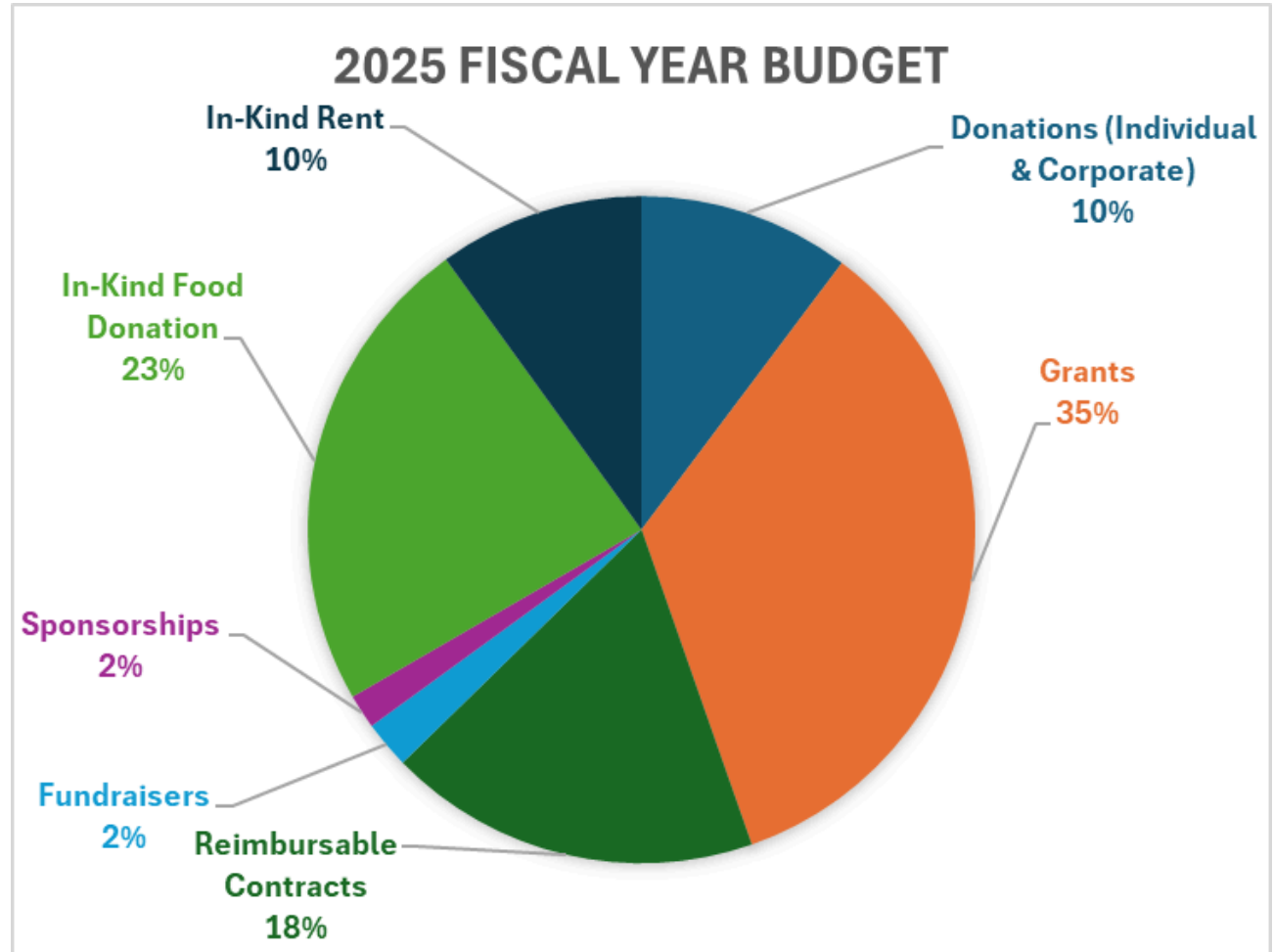
LVTRise plays a central role in strengthening these efforts by serving as a consistent place of connection and collaboration. Each month, we host apartment managers meetings at LVTRise, bringing together apartment owners and managers, Fort Worth Police Department West Division Neighborhood Police Officers, apartment security teams, and community partners. These gatherings provide a trusted, solution-focused space to stay connected, identify emerging concerns, share resources, and discuss the needs of both residents and property staff. In a community where the majority of families live in multifamily housing, these relationships are essential to creating environments where children can sleep safely, parents can focus on work, and community members can build community without fear of displacement.

Because of this strong connection with apartment leadership, LVTRise has been able to more effectively advocate for and serve community members—through eviction prevention, connecting families to financial or social services, assisting with utilities, covering other housing-related expenses, helping families remain in their homes, and supporting them in securing stable housing when transitions are necessary. Housing is often the most expensive and fragile piece of a family's budget, and even a temporary setback can create a crisis. By walking alongside families during these critical moments, we help preserve stability, dignity, and hope. These relationships ensure that the voices of community members are heard and that solutions are responsive to the real and immediate challenges of life in the neighborhood.

Through ongoing training, certification opportunities, and strengthened communication between property managers, community members, and law enforcement, local stakeholders are reinforcing trust, boosting safety, and supporting broader neighborhood stabilization efforts. Notably, overall crime in the Las Vegas Trail area trended downward in 2025, including reductions in both violent and property crime—underscoring the value of collaborative, place-based approaches to safety, advocacy, and housing stability. When housing is stable, communities are stronger—and the progress we are seeing across Las Vegas Trail reflects the power of partnership rooted in both safety and support.

At the same time, our model is truly distinctive. Less than 10% of our operational funding comes from the city. The vast majority is powered by private philanthropy — by leaders and visionaries who choose to stand with us. We are the only community center in Fort Worth structured this way. That makes your support uniquely valuable.
